

## J.A. BizTown

In late January of this year, the Hawthorne 5th and 6th grade ELP, Neighborhood, and C&A classes participated jointly in JA Biztown. JA Biztown, an experiential, all-day field trip experience, is the capstone program for Junior Achievement in the upper elementary grades. Through daily lessons and hands-on activities in the classroom, students prepare to "run the city" for a day. They use critical-thinking skills to learn about key economic concepts. They learn about supply and demand curves, the point of equilibrium, gross and net profit, and cost accounting. They learn how to write checks, balance a checkbook, make deposits and withdraw-

als. The students also had a chance to learn about the types of jobs in their areas of interest and apply for those jobs. They learn how to develop a business plan, write radio and TV advertisements, and how to work as a team. They learn about delegation, job responsibilities, and meeting commitments. They learn how to apply for a loan and what needs to be done to pay it back. They learn about the roles citizens play in their communities as workers and consumers. They learn about philanthropy and what it means to make contributions to those who are less fortunate than they are. They learn how to purchase health insurance and what Worker's Comp can

do for them.

At JA Biztown, students "run" the city for a day. Students are the entrepreneurs who manage businesses ranging from Smith's Marketplace to KSL TV, Zion's Bank to Computech. They sell insurance for Select Health, offer college degrees at the University of Phoenix, install phones, read gas and electric meters, and run the city's Mayoral office. They work hard all day long, with two short breaks and a lunch break. At the end of the day they are thrilled with their experience....and exhausted. Several of them fell asleep on the bus ride back to school.

We extend our profound thanks to our principal,





Marian Broadhead, who paid for the entire field trip and the transportation. She spent some time with us and graciously agreed to be interviewed on our closed-circuit TV system for the JA City. We appreciate the parents who volunteered an entire day to be the shadow supervisors for each business. In the end, the students do the work and gain a glimpse into what their lives will be like in the future as contributing members of their communities. Too bad their debit cards will only work at JA City!
